

What is the NHS?

- NHS = National Health Service.
- Covers all aspects of medical treatment – doctors, nurses, hospitals (and everyone who works in them) ambulances, opticians, dentists, medicines and more...
- Paid for through taxation
- Set up in 1948 by Aneurin Bevan
- Immediately had an enormous impact


