


NEVER STOP CREATING

Passionate about raising awareness of the impact of antimicrobial resistance she, supported by Dr Nicola Barnes, Senior Lecturer at the university, held an interactive learning session for all year 10 students in November.

The session, which re-enforced learning already undertaken on the GCSE Science course, focussed on ways to prevent the spread of infection, the overuse of antibiotics and preventing antibiotic resistance from arising.

The students were also able to experiment and capture visually exciting photography from reflections of the London skyline along the Southbank around Borough.



Inventive, opinionated and commercially minded,

Mary Quant was the most iconic fashion designer of the 1960s.

Quant changed how the world looked. Her vision – her use of shape, and of colour; her choice of material, and of model – really did define an era. She shaped how we make and market fashion, how we buy and wear clothes.





It's hardy surprising therefore that our Year 9 textiles students were blown away by the archives of her work that they were able to explore at the 'Mary Quant' exhibition at the Victoria and Albert Museum in December. The diversity of her work is a true source of inspiration for our students own work as they further develop their skills and individuality.

A DEEPER UNDERSTANDING

For some 500 years, London has been a thriving hotbed of theatre, filling the playhouses with the work of playwrights new and old. In terms of sheer spectacle though, nowhere can best The Globe, the stunning replica of an Elizabethan playhouse.



Elizabethan England is a key part of Year 10 GCSE studies so a trip to the iconic Globe Theatre fuelled further interest and excitement for our students in this area of study.

Interesting lectures helped the girls gain a deeper understanding of this period. The joy of learning was clearly apparent from the smiles of our students as they modelled some historical costumes in interactive workshop sessions.

A CLASS OF ITS OWN

A total transformation of the outdoor, onsite sporting facilities at Brentford School happened over the Summer break.

Our girls returned to school at the start of the new academic year to a fantastic new and highly enviable all-weather Astro turf sports area.

Sport is an important part of the curriculum at Brentford School For Girls. We build character and encourage resilience, perseverance, confidence and teamwork. Our new sporting facilities will help our
